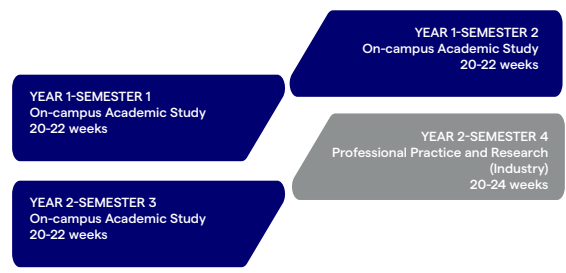

Upon successful assessment of your application, you will be issued a conditional or unconditional offer of study via email. You **must not** use your Letter of offer to apply for a student visa.

Each letter of offer has instructions on what to do next, including how to accept and lodge fee payment.

You need to make sure that you meet the Department of Home Affairs (DHA) requirements for a student visa before you accept an offer and pay any tuition fees.

To accept an offer, you are required to:

Upload a signed copy of the Terms of Agreement (included in your letter of offer) to the application portal directly.

Upload the payment receipt and any requested documents to the application portal directly.

Step 2: Visa application

As an international student, you are required to hold a valid Australian visa for the duration of your study in Australia. The Department of Home Affairs is responsible for issuing visas to students who wish to study in Australia, their website is where you can find the requirements and application process for student visas.

As an international student visa holder, you have a set of responsibilities related to your visa laws and you are obligated to make yourself aware of these responsibilities and visa conditions.

You can apply for your student visa as soon as you receive your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) for a full-time course at CDU.

You will receive an email about Orientation Week information.

Step 1: Accept the offer

Upon successful assessment of your application, you will be issued a conditional or unconditional offer of study via email. You must not use your Letter of offer to apply for a student visa.

The steps to accept your letter are contained in your Letter of Offer.

These are the steps to follow for accepting your offer if you applied to UTAS via StudyLink Connect:

- Read through your offer letter and attached documents and ensure you are able to comply with the requirements, terms, and conditions.
- Login to the University of Tasmania Apply Online Service.
- Go to your submitted application with the status "Offer Made" Under "Actions" go to "Respond to Offer".
- Check your Offer Details and "Accept Offer".
- Pay the commencement fee detailed.

Step 2: Payment

The following steps outline how to make these and any other future payments to the University. Ensure that you keep copies of the payments as proof of payment.

International student fees must be paid via Western Union® Business Solutions

- Log onto <https://student.globalpay.wu.com/> and enter your student information.
- Enter amount of Australian dollars to pay.
- Select payment method – Credit/Debit Card or Telegraphic Transfer.
- Payment finalised .

Western Union will transfer your payment to the University in Australian dollars on the same day we receive your payment.

Step 3: Visa application

Once the fee payment and signed acceptance form have been received, visa processing eligibility will be determined by International Admissions before an electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) form will be emailed to you or your UTAS Representative Agent. You must provide electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) to apply for your student visa via Department of Home Affairs website.

Step 1: Accept the offer

Upon successful assessment of your application, you will be issued a conditional or unconditional offer of study via email. You must not use your Letter of offer to apply for a student visa.

Each letter of offer has instructions on what to do next, including how to accept your offer, the course or courses you are eligible to study, and an acceptance form section.

- Complete and sign your Acceptance Form.
- Log in to Swinburne's International Online Application portal (or ask your agent to do this via the StudyLink Partner Portal) and under Actions, click 'Respond to Offer'.
- Select 'Accept Offer', and upload your signed Acceptance Form, proof of payment of your total deposit (outlined in your offer letter), plus any additional documentation requested, and click 'Accept Offer'.

Step 2: Payment

When you submit your Offer Acceptance Form, you'll need to pay a deposit for your course. The deposit is listed on your Letter of Offer. Usually, it includes a payment towards your tuition fee and a fee for Overseas Student Health Cover.

You can pay via telegraphic transfer or choose from many online payment options such as UnionPay or AllPay (minimum \$2,100) through Western Union Business Solution. Telegraphic transfers made via other organisations cannot be accepted.

Ensure that you keep copies of the payments as proof of payment. You will need it to submit your Offer Acceptance Form.

Your confirmation email will also include important information on how to enrol, set up your student email, log in to Canvas (our learning management system), and orientation activities. So make sure you regularly check your email for updates from SUT.

Step 1: Accept the offer

If your application to ICHM is successful, ICHM will send a Letter of Offer to you or your agent, confirming the course you have been offered, fees payable and course commencement date.

To accept the offer you must sign and return the Acceptance Letter and pay the tuition of first semester and New Student Fee of A\$250. This must be done within 21 days of receiving the Letter of Offer from ICHM.

Upon receipt of the Acceptance Letter and fees, ICHM will formally notify you that you have been accepted. The electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) form will be sent directly to your representative if they are assisting with your application. You will need the electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) to apply for your Student Visa.

Step 2: Payment of Semester Fees

The invoice in step 1 will advise you of the amount and due date for payment. If you receive the Letter of Offer within 60 days or less of the commencement date, then full fees are payable immediately upon receipt of this letter.

Step 3: Visa application

International students intending to study at ICHM must apply for a Student Visa. For more information regarding student visas, visit the Australian Government Department of Home Affairs website.

- New international students will have to pay the first semester fees upfront.
- In subsequent semesters students can elect to pay via instalment.

Step 4: New Student Information Pack

Approximately six weeks prior to course commencement, you will be sent an information pack outlining what you need to bring and answers to frequently asked questions. New students should also advise ICHM when they will arrive at campus and if pickup is required.
