

Making smart choices in a time of uncertainty

"Don't give up. There are always other choices for you. Keep positive – we will find a way out."

That's the message Johnny Gu would like to share with anyone whose future plans have been turned upside down by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Johnny's developed his resilience the hard way, watching his first job in New Zealand's tourism industry disappear when the country's border slammed shut in 2020 to halt the virus.

But he's since seized new opportunities, using the skills he gained during his tourism studies to move into consumer retail. The 24-year-old is now the full-time store manager of a Tauranga bathroom and kitchenware supply company, and is also studying part-time for a Postgraduate Diploma in Management.

The career change means Johnny now spends his work days focusing on products, rather than experiences.

"But the end result is the same, it's all about meeting customer expectations and making them happy," he says.

"I get to know a lot of people. I enjoy offering my suggestions, and then seeing them being considered and put into practice. I do all the things in the shop – selling, organising the warehouse, and marketing."

Johnny's also managing staff for the first time and was grateful when his employer agreed to pay his postgraduate fees.

"I need some more knowledge to do my job better. I can't just rely on myself - I can't do everything, so in the course I'm learning how to motivate employees and how to make them work efficiently to get the best overall result for the shop. It's also helping me learn how to overcome problems."

Johnny was raised in Guangzhou, China, and left his homeland at age 17, headed for Melbourne, Australia. He spent a few years studying foundational courses there, before setting his sights on a better life in New Zealand. "It looked safe, fun and adventurous," he says.

He shifted to New Zealand's capital city, Wellington, and then realised the Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga campus in Rotorua would be an ideal place to learn about the country's thriving tourist industry.

"It's such a popular tourist destination, and I found that Toi Ohomai had a really good history of teaching that subject."

Johnny completed three qualifications: two New Zealand diplomas in tourism and travel (level 5 and level 6), followed by a Bachelor of Tourism Management. The first two courses cross-credited into the degree, which meant it only took three years to complete all the qualifications.

Johnny thoroughly enjoyed each course, which meant Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga was an obvious choice when he decided to start his postgraduate studies earlier this year.

"It's a lovely learning environment, with knowledgeable tutors and lots of great people. I got a lot of help from the International staff and from my classmates during my earlier courses.

"You don't just gain knowledge, you gain a lot of connections – so it gave me the background and the confidence to go along with my journey and my plans."

His latest course is largely online, with occasional classes at the Tauranga campus which complement Johnny's work hours. It will take 18 months to complete the course and he's enjoying the opportunity to meet a whole new group of people.

Johnny's living with flatmates he's met along the way, and in his spare time he plays basketball, goes to the gym, and tries to win poker.

He has a three-year open work visa and would eventually like to establish his own branch or retail store in New Zealand.

"It's such a beautiful country, with friendly people, and the working conditions are less stressful here.

"I would love to go back to tourism - but for now, I will stay focused on my new journey. There are always choices for everyone."





Preparation and arrival in New Zealand

Pre-departure

Arriving in New Zealand

If requested in advance, Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga can arrange to have you picked up from the Auckland, Rotorua or Tauranga airports. International Centre staff will also meet you at your orientation day and will provide all the information you will need to begin your study and settle in to campus life at Rotorua or Tauranga.

Money

- Travel with only a small amount of cash
- Bring traveller's cheques and a credit card to cover your initial expenses
- Open a New Zealand bank account as soon as possible after your arrival

Immigration and student visas

If you are going to study in New Zealand for more than 12 weeks, you will need to apply for a student visa. Check out immigration.govt.nz.



Medical and travel insurance

International students must have appropriate and current medical and travel insurance while in New Zealand, and this usually costs no more than \$600 per academic year.

Uni-Care is our preferred insurance provider. It is important to understand the inclusions stated in the New Zealand Student Plan (visit <u>uni-care.org</u>).

Eligibility for health services

Most international students are not entitled to subsidised health services. If you receive medical treatment while in New Zealand, you may be required to pay the full cost of that treatment. More details are available through the Ministry of Health at health.govt.nz.

Accident insurance

The Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC) provides accident insurance for all temporary visitors to New Zealand, but you may still be required to pay for some or all other medical and related costs. More details are available at acc.co.nz.

Accommodation

Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga can help arrange accommodation while you are here for your studies. For all the latest information, visit the Accommodation page on our website, under the Student Services tab.

Shared accommodation (Tauranga)

Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga offers rental houses close to Windermere Campus. The bedrooms are lockable and furnished. Living areas and bathrooms are shared with at least one other student. These houses contain essential cooking utensils, crockery and appliances, a washing machine, fridge/freezer and television.

Homestay

We recommend living in a homestay option, especially if you are studying English and want to be able to practise your English with your host family. The family environment can also ease the adjustment of living in a new country as you experience different food, language and customs. We recommend you commit to staying at least one month with your homestay family while you adjust to life in Rotorua or Tauranga and while you and your homestay family get used to each other.

The homestay fee includes your own room, power, and access to kitchen, bathroom and laundry facilities - it may also include internet access. Extra charges apply if you are under 18 years old.

The weekly homestay fee is NZ\$230-\$290 including food, or \$170-\$190 without food.

Flatting (sharing a house)

If you plan to live in a rented house or apartment with one or more people, we call that "flatting". You and your flatmates will be responsible for finding your own furniture, bedding, cooking utensils and other household necessities. You can find all of these new items at shops in town or, to keep costs down, you can buy from second-hand shops or online (e.g. Trade Me).

You will need to share the cost of power and other bills, cook your meals, do your own laundry and your share of household cleaning, and abide by the rental agreement.

It can take some time to find a flat to rent and you may need to stay in temporary accommodation for the first month after arriving in New Zealand. This is where short-term shared accommodation or a homestay option would be desirable.

Basic expenses

- Rents for students in our area range from NZD\$150-\$270 per week; this includes power and water.
- Groceries for one person costs approximately NZD\$80-\$130 per week.
- Allow for general expenses of NZD\$50-\$120 per week.



Accommodation for families

Most of the accommodation providers Toi Ohomai works with are set up to host individual students only; few can accept a family or couple.

If you plan to bring your family, we strongly recommend that you come to New Zealand on your own first and arrive a couple of weeks before our orientation programme. Arriving early will give you time to look for long-term family accommodation in the private housing market.

If your family comes with you, you may need to stay in a hotel or motel while you try to find long-term accommodation. This can be very expensive.
