Demand for experienced registered nurses is good, and expected to continue growing due to:

- increasing need for nursing care as the population ages
- older nurses retiring the New Zealand Nurses
 Organisation reports 50% of nurses will retire by 2035
- funding in the 2019 Wellbeing Budget for nurses to work in mental health, addictions, child wellbeing, and on school-based programmes
- an international shortage of nurses.

Registered nurse appears on' Tier 2 role eligible for work to residence' in Immigration New Zealand's Green list in 2022. This means the Government is actively encouraging skilled registered nurses from overseas to work in New Zealand.

85% of nurses who graduated in November 2018

had a job as a registered nurse within four months of graduation, according to the Nursing Education in the Tertiary Sector organisation.

Year 2: Focus on nursing individuals with physical and mental illness. This year also includes community placements.

Year 3: Focus on the complexity of caring for individuals, young and old, and their families in hospital and community settings. Develop clinical skills, clinical reasoning and decision-making skills to nurse people with complex health conditions. Study the impact of developmental and rehabilitation issues.

Progression requirements

For Certificate in Foundation Studies students applying for entry to AUT in 2023.
