

Enrolled nurses are vital to New Zealand's healthcare system, working in hospitals, aged care, community health, and mental health. As of April 2025, over 340 positions are advertised nationwide, showing strong demand for qualified professionals.

New Zealand has around **1,800** nursing vacancies, with high

demand in areas like mental health, critical care, and emergency services.² Enrolled nurses play a key role in supporting these growing

Who's eligible to apply?

Academic Requirements

International applicants must meet one of the following academic requirements. In all cases, the qualification must include a pass in Mathematics:

- An educational standard equivalent to or higher than NCEA Level 2, OR
- · An equivalent overseas high school qualification, OR
- · A comparable qualification.

English Language Requirements

- Academic IELTS 6.5 (with no band score lower than 6.5), OR
- An equivalent result from a single test taken within two years of the programme start date.

Where this qualification can take you

Once you graduate, you will apply and complete the Nursing Council of New Zealand state final examination for enrolled nursing to be registered and allowed to work as an enrolled nurse. Enrolled nurses collaborate with registered nurses and other registered health practitioner* to provide safe and effective care across a range of healthcare settings:

- Hospitals (public and private)
- Primary healthcare

- Mental health and addiction services
- Community and residential care facilities
- Aged care, disability support, and home-based care

*A health practitioner is a person registered under the Health Practitioners Competence Assurance Act 2003 — for example, a nurse practitioner, midwife, or medical practitioner. Where the term nurse is defined in other legislation, this scope of practice includes general nursing and nursing functions.



What you could *earn* as an enrolled nurse

Pay for enrolled nurses varies depending on skills, experience, and location. Enrolled nurses are in strong demand across New Zealand's healthcare sector, offering stable employment and competitive salaries.

Nursing *in demand* across New Zealand

The need for enrolled nurses remains strong in New Zealand, with around **1,800** nursing vacancies nationwide and over **340** enrolled nurses positions advertised on SEEK as of April 2025. This highlights the urgent demand for qualified professionals.

This demand is driven by factors such as an **ageing population** and **increasing healthcare needs**. Enrolled nurses have opportunities to work across a variety of settings, including **hospitals**, **aged care facilities**, **and community health services**. As the healthcare sector continues to grow, this profession offers stable employment and the chance to make a meaningful impact on patient care across the country.





Clinical placements – putting it into practice

You'll gain real nursing experience through **700 hours** of clinical placements with a range of leading health providers. During your placement, you will be assessed against the Nursing Council Competencies for Enrolled Nursing.

At least **200 hours** will be in our Clinical Simulation Suite with experienced tutors, helping you build confidence before entering clinical settings. Your placements will then expose you to the realities of being an enrolled nurse and allow you to:

- develop and apply your knowledge and skills
- develop attitudes and insights related to being an enrolled nurse
- review your own knowledge and skills as you develop
- gain experience within specific areas of nursing

New scope of enrolled nurses

(effective from January 2025)

The role of enrolled nurses in New Zealand has changed—opening up **more opportunities**, **responsibilities**, **and workplaces** than ever before. These changes are designed to reflect the evolving needs of the healthcare sector and give enrolled nurses a stronger, more active role in patient care. With the updated scope, enrolled nurses can now:

- **practise more independently** in partnership with registered nurses and other health professionals
- assess patients and contribute to care decisions, not just follow plans made by registered nurses
- work in a wider range of settings including emergency departments, GP clinics, rural health centres, and private hospitals
- put a stronger focus on cultural safety and Te Tiriti o Waitangi
- take on recognised leadership and coordination roles, beyond just supporting healthcare assistants under registered nurse supervision
- complete a **modernised diploma** with 700+ clinical hours and broader skills
- follow **five core nursing standards ("pou")** instead of 29 older competencies
