Q5. What was the Foundation programme like?

It was a fast-track, six-month course that really prepared me for uni life. We had regular classes five days a week, and I took subjects like Marketing, Economics, English, and Māori history. It helped me develop time management and responsibility early on.

Q6. Was the Foundation programme tailored to your future university major?

Yes! At UPIC, they actually help match your subjects to your future major. Since I wanted to study business, I got to take economics and marketing. Others who were going into computer science or health had different courses. That really helped with the transition.

Q7. Did Foundation programme helps you get familiar with AUT?

Absolutely! During the Foundation course, we visited AUT at least four times. We got to explore different faculties, meet the lecturers, and see what uni life would be like. By the time I officially started at AUT, I already knew my way around. It made a big difference.
