Q1. Why did you choose the Foundation programme leading to Victoria University of Wellington?

Having a direct pathway to the University of my choice was my main reason for choosing the Foundation programme along with gaining tools to better equip me for university study in a different country. This includes referencing, academic writing styles and learning how to use different academic software.

Q2. How did the Foundation programme help prepare you for your Bachelor's study?
